F. DELEGATIONS AND PRESENTATIONS

1 Municipal Policing Bureau Re: OPP Contract/Billing

Sergeant Rob Griffin, Municipal Policing Specialist, West Region and Janet Weaver, Municipal Policing Specialist, East Region, Municipal Policing Bureau were in attendance.

Sergeant Griffin provided an overview of the OPP integrated service delivery model and municipal policing resources, noting that officers have both municipal and provincial policing responsibilities. The Daily Activity Reporting (DAR) system is used to separate municipal and provincial responsibilities and track billing.

J. Weaver provided an overview of the OPP billing model, highlighting the three components used to calculate costs: 1) base service cost, which is a cost per property as determined by MPAC and covers the basic services provided for municipalities (i.e.: proactive policing, RIDE programs, training, administrative duties); 2) calls for service cost; and 3) other costs, which includes overtime, court security, etc. It was added that the base cost recovery per property has remained relatively stable over the past ten (10) years.

Sergeant Griffin reviewed the OPP 2023 annual billing statement and spoke to the breakdown per component. Discussion ensued about calls for service categories and billing groups, upcoming changes with the new Community Safety and Policing Act, enhancement options, and online resources. The County's cost per policing is comparable to neighbouring municipalities.

Community Mobilization Officer	In the month of August, there were approximately 11 generated calls for service where our Community Mobilization Officer (CMO), PC Simone ROESINK has been engaged. Haldimand County had approximately 29 mental health calls in the month of August. In August, Haldimand County CMO attended 5 library readings, 7 kids safety camp talks, and lead a fight fraud presentation. As we are still seeing many fraud calls, Haldimand County strongly encourages members of the public to attend to the fraud presentations.
Mobile Crisis Response Team (MCRT)	MCRT continues to provide support for non-MHA calls for service including Well Being Checks, Domestics, Sudden Deaths, MVC's, and a variety of other calls. The Haldimand OPP has recently hired two new full time MCRT clinicians. Haldimand OPP has also newly implemented a tracking form. This form will allow for a consistent method of tracking MCRT involvement in mental health related occurrences, which will improve the organization's ability to evaluate the effectiveness and demonstrate a return on investment. Since August 16, MCRT has attended 13 calls including Mental Health Act, Family Disputes, Assault, Threaten Suicide and Trouble with Youth.


Notable Increases

MVC REPORT

There were 66 collisions in Haldimand County in August. (54 Property Damage, 12 Personal Injury, and 0 Fatal). Collisions were up 1.5% from August of 2022. They were down 13.9% year to date.

Property Damage collisions for August reported at 54. Property Damage collisions did see an increase of 1 (1.9%) from August last year. A year-to-date decrease of 16.8% was observed from the same time frame last year.

Non-fatal Injury collisions for August reported at 12. Non-Fatal Injury collisions did see an increase of 1 (9.1%) from August last year. A year-to-date increase of 3.8% was observed from the same time frame last year.

Non-Fatal injury collisions totaled 12 for August. In reviewing the collisions, they ranked as follows: inattentive driver (2), pedestrian (2), fail to yield right-of-way (2), improper turn (2), following too closely (2), lost control (1) and ability impaired by drugs (1).

MEMORANDUM TO HALDIMAND COUNTY POLICE SERVICES BOARD & COUNCIL September 23, 2023

As part of the communication strategy for both the Haldimand County Police Service Board (PSB) and the Haldimand County OPP (OPP), this memo serves to set out paths for information sharing between the PSB, the OPP and County Council members. This is intended to serve the citizens of Haldimand County and all involved stakeholders while ensuring timely responses to operational policing matters and respecting the confidentiality of involved citizens.

When a member of the community contacts a member of either the PSB or County Council directly in relation to policing matters, that are operational in nature, that require police intervention, consideration should always be given to directing the community members to contact 1-888-310-1122 for a police response.

This suggestion is made for several reasons:

- generating a call for service allows for an officer to be dispatched to attend the scene and avoids unnecessary delays in addressing an issue.
- generating a call for service raises awareness of community concerns for not only the officer responding but for any of the other officers that hear/read the incident.
- the call for service may support a bigger ongoing investigation that we track through our records management system.
- the call for service supports the data keeping and the workload analysis of our Haldimand officers.
- a cruiser being dispatched to area may serve as a deterrent for the problematic event/behavior.

This is not intended to be an exhaustive list of the many reasons to utilize our Provincial Communication Centre, rather to share an understanding of some of the impacts when citizens do not contact the OPP directly for operational matters.

If a citizen is calling to complain about policing service they have received, there are two (2) alternatives in keeping with the expectations of the Office of the Independent Police Review Director (OIPRD). Attending the Haldimand Detachment or calling during our hours of operations will provide the member of the public an opportunity to speak with the Sergeant, S/Sgt or Inspector who may be able to resolve the complaint locally if the citizen is willing. Alternatively, the citizen can engage with the OIPRD directly to file a complaint.
