Re: Ministry of Education Update on 2018 Child Care Allocations

The purpose of this information package memo is to inform Council of an adjustment that has been made by the Ministry of Education to the 2018 Child Care Allocations for both Haldimand and Norfolk Counties.

Correspondence was received from the Ministry of Education Director, Early Years and Child Care Programs and Service Integration Branch on August 17, 2018. The memorandum states that in 2018 the provincial government will now invest approximately \$1.67 billion in child care.

The allocations for year 2 child care expansion funding have been revised to be prorated for September to December 2018. In Haldimand and Norfolk this means that our previously announced allocation of \$466,500 has been reduced to \$333,873, a reduction of \$132,627. This information has been communicated to the Children's Services team with the direction to adjust plans for the rest of 2018 to stay within the amended funding envelope from the Ministry of Education.

The Ministry also indicated that several important changes have been made to child care programs with a focus on supporting child care affordability across the province, better meeting the needs of local communities, and reducing administrative burden. The specifics of these changes will be communicated to Consolidated Municipal Services Managers (CMSMs) when the amended Transfer Payment Agreements and Service Management and Funding Guidelines are released. Any significant changes that will impact the delivery of child care services by the Social Services and Housing Department will be communicated to Council in a future staff report.

Staff will continue to keep Council apprised of any provincial announcements that impact the funding and/or services provided by the Social Services and Housing Department as the CMSM.

Re: Upcoming Changes to Social Assistance

The purpose of this information memo is to inform Council of the upcoming changes to Social Assistance ("Ontario Works" and "ODSP") that were announced by the Minister of Children, Community and Social Services, the Honourable Lisa MacLeod, on July 31, 2018.

The main points of the announcement are:

- The Provincial government is no longer proceeding with changes to social assistance (regulatory changes) that would have come into effect this fall. These included the exemption of tax free savings accounts and registered retirement savings plans as assets; the elimination of the board and lodge rate; a change in the definition of spouse to align with the Family Law Act; the exemption of gifts and voluntary payments as income; and the increase in the flat rate exemption from \$200 to \$400.
- Social assistance changes that were implemented in April and July 2018 will remain in effect.
- The Provincial government will be coming forward with a new plan for the
 delivery of social assistance within the next 100 days. While no details of the plan
 are currently available, it was mentioned during the announcement that the plan
 will help people to find and retain employment and participate in their
 communities.
- The Ministry will be providing a 1.5% increase to social assistance benefits. The
 rate increase will be effective September 1, 2018 for the Ontario Disability
 Support Program and October 1, 2018 for Ontario Works. This is a change from

the 3% rate increase that was previously announced. The increase is a cost of living adjustment to the benefits rate.

In addition to the above, the Minister also announced that the Provincial government will be winding down the Ontario Basic Income pilot project. Currently, 4,000 Ontarians in four communities are participating in the pilot by exiting Ontario Works and the Ontario Disability Support Program to receive a basic guaranteed income that is at a higher level than social assistance. It is anticipated that there will be further announcements as to how pilot participants will transition back to social assistance as they may currently be in market rent living situations that will not be affordable once the pilot ends. Concerns have been raised by anti-poverty advocates and some Boards of Health across the Province that people will experience hardship as a result of the cancellation of the pilot project. Residents of Haldimand County and Norfolk County are not affected by this part of the announcement as this area was not a pilot site.

No further details are available at this time so staff are unable to provide Council with any analysis of how these announcements will affect service delivery of the Ontario Works program in Haldimand and Norfolk Counties. Staff will prepare a future information memo for Council once more details are released about the Provincial government's plan for social assistance delivery.

Re: NAFTA – Dairy Supply Management Program

Be it Resolved That:

WHEREAS it appears that Mexico and the U.S.A have come to an agreement on trade terms and now intense scrutiny is on Canada as our negotiators attempt to come to an agreement as well, and our Dairy Management system is once more front and centre in the news:

WHEREAS supply management means that our Canadian dairy farms produce enough milk for Canadians and Canada allows 10% import of tariff free dairy products and the U.S.A caps tariff free imports at about 2.75%, so the U.S.A also protects their dairy industry;

WHEREAS we want our dairy products to continue to be produced on Canadian farms, under the strictest animal welfare, milk quality and food safety standards in the world;

NOW THEREFORE the Township of Amaranth, as a predominantly farming community, urge the Federal Government to not allow a foreign party to interfere with our Dairy Management System and that it be removed from all North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) negotiations;

Cannabis Production Facilities – Fact Sheet

Cannabis Production Facilities (CPFs) are currently permitted in Ontario for the purposes of growing / distributing cannabis for medical purposes (i.e. medical marihuana). In October of 2018, CPFs that grow cannabis for non-medical purposes (i.e. recreational marihuana) are expected to become legal. The three levels of government (federal, provincial, municipal) all have a role in the regulation of these facilities which is summarized as follows:

Federal Government	Provincial Government	Municipal Government (Haldimand County)
Health Canada is the approval authority for Cannabis Production Facilities (CPF's), including the medical marihuana regime and regulation of the production of non-medical cannabis (recreational marihuana) upon its legalization. All CPFs require a license from Health Canada. Through the licensing process, Health Canada regulates the following: • All aspects of security, including fencing, cameras and lighting • Production practices, including management of microbial and chemical contents of seeds and plants • All aspects of packaging, labelling and shipping (including importing and exporting) • Client registrations and transactions There is no requirement from Health Canada for parties pursuing a production license to notify area residents of their intent to establish a licensed CPF on a given property.	Production Facilities: The Normal Farm Practices Protection Board (Board) operates in conjunction with the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs (OMAFRA). The Board was established under the Farming and Food Production Protection Act with the mandate to resolve disputes regarding agricultural operations and to determine what constitutes a normal farm practice. In performing that function, the Board seeks to balance the needs of the agricultural community with health, safety and environmental concerns. A person directly affected by a disturbance from an agricultural operation (such as a CPF) may apply to the Board, after they have gone through a conflict resolution process facilitated by OMAFRA, for a determination as to whether the disturbance results from a normal farm practice. Disturbances can include things such as: odour, noise, dust, light, smoke, flies and vibration. The Board renders a decision regarding the farm practice and can require the farmer (operator/grower) to modify the activity to mitigate the disturbance. Apart from the above, the Province's role is currently limited. Regulations and guidelines are still being developed for the Province of Ontario to address odour issues.	A municipal Government (Haldimand County) A municipality's role is limited to where a CPF can go (i.e. in which land use zones it is permitted) and how they are laid out on site (i.e. zoning provisions such as setbacks and site design regulation through site plan control) • Are CPFs currently permitted in Haldimand County? Yes, CPFs are currently permitted in 'Agricultural (A)' zones and are treated as an agricultural use (crop growing). All existing 'Agricultural (A)' zone requirements for setbacks, building height limitations, etc. are applicable. • Is the County considering any further regulation? Production Facilities: Yes, as part of the on-going development of a comprehensive County-wide zoning by-law, unique provisions for CPFs are being developed. While they are in draft form at present, the unique provisions would seek to establish: • Customized zoning provisions, including increased setbacks from sensitive land uses (e.g. residential, institutional) that are more in line with the setbacks required for livestock facilities and kennels (e.g. 150 metres building setback from residential/institutional lot lines); • A site plan control process which will to regulate all aspects of

consideration early in 2019.

Retail Sales:

When it's legal, people 19 and over will be able to purchase recreational cannabis initially online through the Ontario Cannabis Store (OCS). The OCS website, which will be operated by the Province, will be the only legal option for purchasing recreational cannabis once the Federal government legalizes it in October 2018. It will follow strict rules set by the federal government.

The Ontario government is also expected to introduce legislation that, if passed, would open up a tightly regulated private retail model for recreational cannabis that would launch by April 1, 2019. The Province has indicated that private stores would be regulated, with the protection of youth and children as a top priority, and with an aim to help the Province combat the illegal market. It is anticipated that the Province will allow municipalities to decide whether or not they want to host these retail establishments. County Council will be tasked with making this decision (opt in or opt out of being a host) should the Province offer up this ultimatum.

Retail Sales:

Yes, if Council opts in to allowing retail sales we expect to introduce zoning regulations that regulate where the activity can occur and introduce separation distances from specific uses (i.e. schools).

These zoning changes are expected to be presented to Council for consideration early in 2019.
