Building & Municipal Enforcement Services Division



- CityView Portal completed data collection, all program testing, and in-depth staff training
- Testing of electronic plan review (via Bluebeam) which allows for digital mark-ups of building plans and more efficient work processes.
- **COVID Parks Patrol** hired 3 additional students to patrol major County park areas (Dunnville, Caledonia) = over 900 parks/COVID warnings and over 500 parking tickets

Looking Ahead - BME in 2022

- Completion of Digitalization Project: which will result in all historic County Building files in digital / accessible format
- CityView Portal (Building): go 'full live' with e-permitting (electronic application and plan submission, on line payment, electronic permit issuance)
- Electronic Plan Review (Bluebeam): full implementation & staff training of on-screen mark-up of plan submissions / tracking of changes
- Building Permit Fee Review complete 5 year assessment of fee schedule, including public consultation
- Develop and implement tools and process in CityView Portal for electronic submission of by-law complaints

Planning & Development Division



- Official Plan Update Phase 1 (30 year Growth Strategy) Council adoption and Provincial Approval
- Official Plan Phase 2 Completed public consultation, major background research, policy development
- Obtained and processed all 2020 aerial imagery completed via the SWOOP program
- CityView Portal workflow testing, update of templates and forms, and all staff training for electronic and portal platform





Applications & Reviews

- 221 reviewed vs. 5 year average of 169 (compliance 70%)
- 526 engineering documents reviewed vs. 5 year average of 255 (65% compliance)

- o includes Natural Heritage System, Affordable Housing, agricultural lands review, and Frank Marshall Business Park (re)visioning
- 'Go live' with **electronic application** intake process through CityView Portal (public launch/promotion, public user education)
- Archaeological Master Plan retain consultant and initiate work on County-wide AMP
- Parkland Dedication Bylaw finalize assessment, policy review and implement bylaw re: land conveyance and cash in lieu



Economic Development & Tourism



- Innovation Award for Haldimand Tourism: the Real. Local. Tourism Strategy that was implemented to support local businesses and position tourism offerings through the pandemic
- Launch of Development Concierge Team with EDT, Planning, Building and Engineering Divisions – 13 projects run through team review process
- Haldimand Wish Book (Version 2.0):
 - Print wish book featuring 32 local businesses distributed to 22,684 households
 - Online directory features more than 80 business listings
 - New elements include: 12 Days of Giveaways contest, a winter sweepstakes contest and enhanced wish book landing page
- Approval and launch of the County's Farm 911 Emily Project which assists first responders in property identification and access
 - Staff secured sponsorships to cover cost of 35 signs in 2021 and up to 55 signs for 2022
 - 31 signs have been issued one of the highest program uptakes in the Province

Looking Ahead – EDT in 2022

- Caledonia Employment Lands Strategy: a multi-phase plan for the development of serviced employment / industrial lands within Haldimand County, specifically Caledonia
- Signage Strategy: Ensuring consistent messaging, quality and brand standards are applied to all Corporate signage and updated replacement schedule
- My Main Street & RED Programs: grant funding used to hire 3 staff for business support initiatives (retention, expansion, marketing)



Community Development & Partnerships Division



- Support for **Community Halls** administered financial support package; COVID protocol supports
- Recruitment and full launch of Youth Advisory Committee and Seniors Advisory Committee
- Launch of **fund-raising campaign for Hagersville Library + Active Living Centre project** including:
 - Establishment of Community Fund-Raising Committee and associated strategy
 - \$1.5 million in public donations secured in campaign's earliest stages
 - Engagement (online and in-person using COVID-associated protocols), communications and solicitation materials
- Introduction to youth tennis program Program ran in Caledonia, Dunnville and Jarvis with a total of 85 youth participating (ranging 8-18 years old)



Community Development & Programs



- **27,606 public swim** participants (2019 = 31,000)
- **1,514 swimming lesson** participants (2019 = 1,800)
- **941 summer camp** users (2019 = 2,500)
- **6,036 free skate** participants (2019 = 17,000)



Community capital projects:

 4 projects approved / completed totalling \$39,200 (CPP \$11,200; Community \$28,000)

Community Beautification:

 18 projects totalling \$131,153 (HC \$50,250; Community \$80,903)

Heritage & Culture Activities & Programs



Cayuga Heritage Centre:

- virtual/inperson/outreach
 adult programming
 resulted in almost
 100 participants;
- research requests remained high (>225)



Edinburgh Square:

- ten virtual programs uploaded (July, August) with 200 participants
- five sold out children's workshops



WMMSM:

- Children's in-person workshops exceeded projections with almost 100 participants
- Secured \$90,000
 grant for accessibility
 ramp installation



Displays & Content

- Installed five new exhibitions at H&C sites, plus three at HCAB
- Art & artifact installations in HCAB



Looking Ahead – CDP in 2022

Complete the Community & Recreation Facilities
 Strategy to identify priorities/potential partnerships and level of support by community



- Continuing engagement with, and support of, community groups undertaking projects/activities on County property
- Working with our Youth and Seniors Advisory Committees
- Expansion of online recreation and culture programming and resources, including launch of HCTV (Heritage & Culture Television)
- GeoTOUR and PATH versions 2.0
- Community volunteer recovery and revitalization regular meetings, workshops, resource provision, volunteer recognition night



Emergency Services Division



- Negotiated a Fire Service Agreement with Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation
- All County Paramedics completed **Palliative Care training** to respond to palliative patients within the community. This program will assist in treating patients at home instead of ER visits
- Community Paramedic Program was expanded to include more resources for High Intensity Patients which will allow Community Paramedics to monitor patients remotely, and respond accordingly when acute conditions arise
- Haldimand's Community Paramedic program received funding for a **homeless prevention program**, which will see Community Paramedic's and Social Services staff in the community assisting the homeless population with support for housing, medical treatments, etc.
- Management of the County's response to the COVID pandemic, including the County's Emergency Operations
 Centre
- Planning and supports for the Cayuga arena mass vaccination clinic, including design and set up. Paramedics
 participated in vaccinating and monitoring of patients on-site, in LTC facilities and in the homes of vulnerable
 populations. Firefighters were onsite at the clinics to provide traffic control, and front entrance security to
 ensure an organized flow of patients to receive vaccinations

- 1,034 total incidents
- 5 year average: 987



Paramedic Services

- 10,384 total calls
- 5 year average: 10,163



Looking Ahead - Emergency Services in 2022

- Continue planning for the **new Caledonia Fire/Paramedic station** including detailed design for construction
- Negotiation of paramedic union contract with OPSEU
- Community Paramedic Program continue current program for High Intensity Patients (HISH), and roll out of the new LTC initiative = expectations of 200+ clients
- Fire Master Plan/Community Risk Assessment retain and work with consultant to assist in preparing a plan to ensure services meet the needs of growing community (equipment, services, education, training, administration, facilities)
