Under the direction of Executive Director Jane Scheel, our team is constantly adapting while striving to meet the needs of the women they serve. HNWS would not be able to provide the services we do without the amazing team who work day in and day out to overcome every obstacle and challenge they face to support women in our community.

This year we were able to resume a few of our incredible community events. We welcomed community members and supporters to our Wrapped in Courage Event in November, and were excited to once again host our annual Trivia Night on International Women's Day. The remarkable number of community members who attended these events, along with other events throughout the year, reinforce the importance of HNWS in our community.

As a board we are constantly striving to ensure we are creating the environment for Jane and her team to carry out their important work, ensure we are meeting our governance obligations, and looking for new ways to support women in Haldimand and Norfolk. After the presentation by Nurse Practitioner Kristie Jones at the 2022 AGM, we created a Women's Health Committee to explore ways HNWS can create opportunities to further support Women's Health in Haldimand and Norfolk. We are proud of the current partnership with Kristie to support women in the shelter and are exploring opportunities to support even more women in the community. In April, the board also met with Dr. Richard Leblanc for a learning session to ensure that we are functioning as a responsible non-profit governance board.

This year we were eager to review the recommendations from the Renfrew inquest, which will be shared by Marlene Ham at the 2023 AGM. The HNWS Board of Directors is investigating ways we can advocate and support the implementation of these recommendations.

I am excited to work with the amazing members of the HNWS Board of Directors. The board is made up of a group of women who bring a diverse range of expertise and lived experiences to the table. Next year we will be revisiting the HNWS Strategic Plan as part of our commitment to staying current and reflective on our work.

My sincere appreciation to the Staff, Executive Director and Board Members for your continued support of our agency and your service to our community.

At the end of our fiscal year in March 2023 we had been providing service amid COVID for 1080 days. We continued to meet the needs of the women and children in our community seeking our service. Throughout the year we have made many changes based on directives from both our funder and Public Health. These changes had no impact on the quality of service we offered or the ability to meet our client's needs.



We welcomed 2 new board members this year, Michelle Alvey and Ashley Malo. They have been a great compliment to our already fabulous board. Rebecca Malo assumed the role of Board Chair this year and has provided thoughtful and valuable leadership. Michelle Becker will be retiring from the Board; Michelle has been a champion of our work since she joined the Board, and I am confident we will continue to benefit from her support.

We have enjoyed several successes in the past year. For the first time as the only supporting agency, we hosted a very successful GIRLS Power Camp in December. This program is valued by our organization, and we are committed to making sure it has a "forever" home with HNWS. Our Board launched a Women's Health Committee and have engaged the Health Teams from both Haldimand & Norfolk. The opportunities that lie ahead are very exciting and will improve the quality of life for our clients. We are in the process of reviewing our Strategic Plan, we have fast-tracked many of our objectives and are reconsidering some of the others with our sights set on a new Strategic Plan for 2024.

I want to acknowledge the leadership of our Program Supervisor Sam Curtain from the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services who makes his priority recognizing the work we do and the women and children we serve. I could not be prouder of the amazing Staff I have the pleasure to work with, led by a Management Team that are rock solid and want only the best for our organization. The staff act with empathy first which makes them all such great advocates.

The issue of Gender Based Violence continues to be part of the fabric of our lives. We hold inquests, we report femicides, we do research and provide statistics, and yet it continues. I recently was profoundly impacted by the following statement, "As long as two men kissing sparks more outrage than a man hitting a woman, there will always be something wrong in the world."
