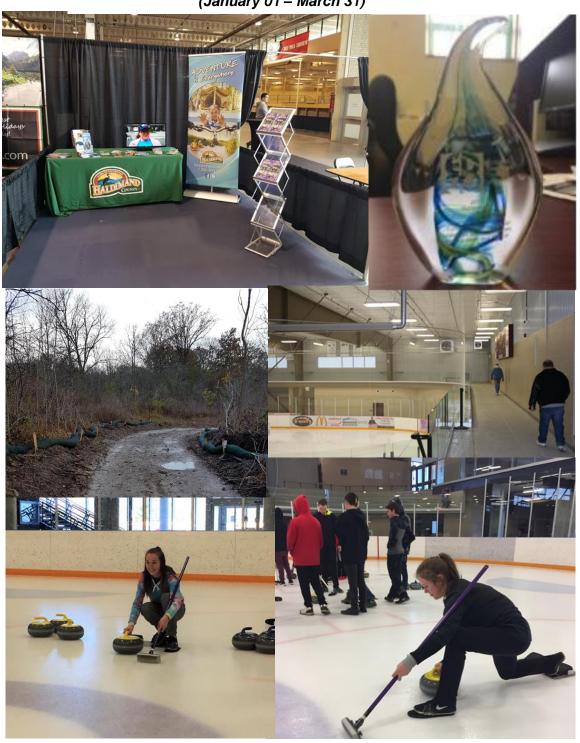

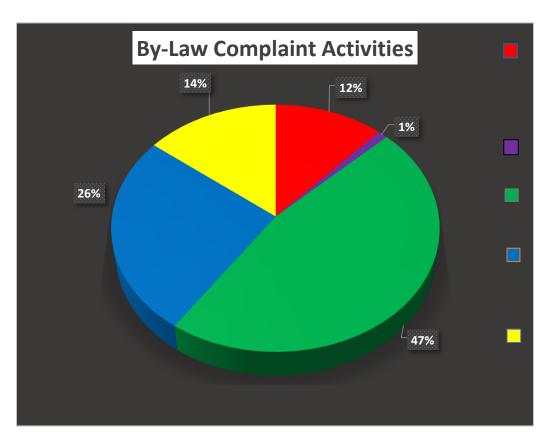

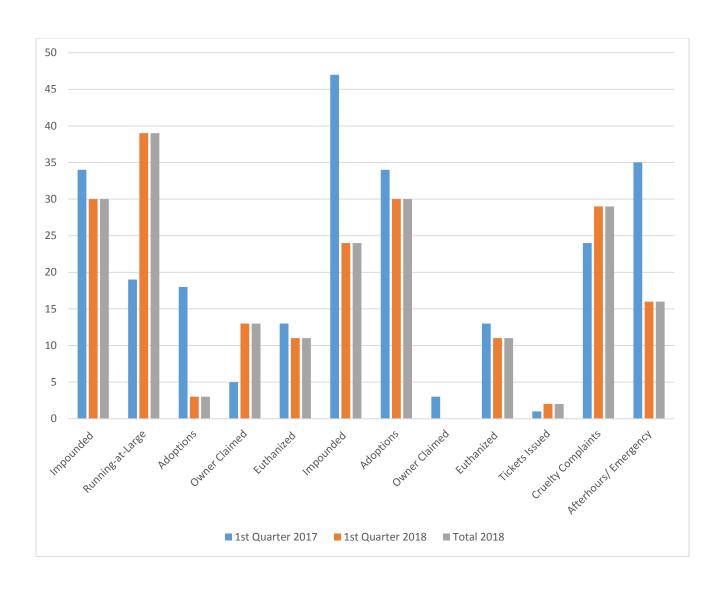

HIGHLIGHTS

Heritage & Culture:

- Museum users (visitors, outreach, researcher) and volunteer hours has decreased due to the closure at Edinburgh Square for renovations.
- Heritage Day, Selkirk (February 19th) had an excellent response to Blood Brothers travelling exhibition (Outreach numbers 750).
- Capital projects completed at Wilson MacDonald: new flooring in gallery and basement meeting/storage; OTF150 and CIP150 projects at Edinburgh Square complete (Lighting; HVAC; washroom upgrades).
- Heritage Haldimand: outreach featuring Underground Railroad and Canfield Black Settlement very successful with well over 200 attendees at various locations around Haldimand.

Programming:

- 91 members of the community participated in free Family Day activities held at all four arena locations.
- Family Day Free Skates increased by 207 participants from 2017 to 2018, this can be attributed to multi media advertising for these programs.
- March Break Camp participation capacity rate has decreased due to last minute cancellations.
- Kilometres walked at the Cayuga and Dunnville walking tracks has a combined decrease of 3,263 kms. This can be attributed to many hockey teams finishing early this year.
- Participation in County Ice programs including March Break has decreased, consistent data collection continues to be a challenge.
- Learn to Curl participation increased due to interest generated by the recent Winter Olympics.
- Prime and Non-Prime ice usage has decreased as a result of an early Easter; most hockey leagues ended there seasons earlier. The Easter holiday weekend in 2017 occurred in the third week April.

Partnerships:

- Since 2011, 44 CPP capital projects have been completed/reconciled; 11 have been approved and are currently 'in progress'.
- \$1.8 million in community funding has leveraged \$3.2 million in projects.
- This year, a record number of Community Beautification grants have been approved (22).

Trails:

- Chippewa Trail Phase 2 is 97% Complete. Deficiencies to be addressed in April. Signage
 will be completed by end of April. Empire to complete the portion on their lands to join
 Phase 2, is scheduled for 2018 summer completion.
- Cayuga Bridge Trail and Caledonia to York naming process has begun. Tender closes April 17th. Construction starts on Cayuga Bridge portion in May. Both will be completed by August 31st (construction and signage).

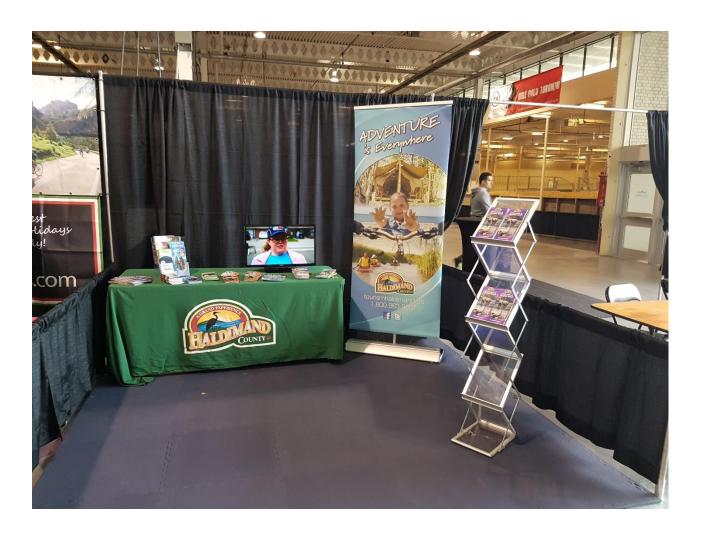

HIGHLIGHTS

- Attended the Toronto Motorcycle Show to promote Tourism Haldimand with our partners at Ontario's Southwest and Cruise the Coast.
- Received an award from the Economic Developers Council of Ontario for best Promotional Publication for the Culinary Adventure Guide, as well as receiving an honourable mention in the same category for the Fishing Spot Guide.
- Exhibited at the Toronto International Bicycle Show in Toronto to promote cycling tourism in partnership with Mudcat Marathon and Grand Dunnville Cycling Tour.
- Released Tourism Data Results for 2017 from the data collection project implemented from recommendations in the Tourism Strategy.
- In collaboration with Brantford-Brant Business Resource Centre, held three information sessions in Haldimand for youth to learn about Summer Company.
- Further collaboration with Grand Erie District School Board and Brantford-Brant Business Resource Centre to host a program called Student Biz for high school students interested

in running their own business. Students attend 4 full day sessions and receive 2 high school credits. The programming will assist those students that want to proceed with applying to the Summer Company Program.

- Completed the ad sales for the 2018 Spring/Summer Community Guide.
- Completed the 10th episode filming of Impulse series.
- Completed the first detailed tourism marketing strategy vetted through the Tourism Network.
- Completed the 10 year review for the Community Improvement Plan with Council's approval for an ongoing program.

1. Dunnville Waterfront Park

 - Weather limitations for construction project task planning completed and remobilization plan developed.

b) Dunnville Waterfront Park - Phase 2

- Project initiated.
- Accomplished January to March:
 - Contract completed to retain professional services of consultant for site plan and construction drawings.

2. McClung Community

- Project on-going multi year process.
- Accomplished January to March:

- Work relating to final registration of Phase 3A-2 of Avalon West completed which will open up an additional 36 single detached residential dwelling lots and 5 development blocks for up to 28 townhouse units (64 residential units total).
- Approval of detailed engineering submission and preliminary work for pre-servicing agreement for Phase 3B of Avalon East (122 single detached dwellings).
- Approval of linear park plan and McClung round-about designs and construction initiation of same.

3. Caledonia Master Servicing Plan Update

 - Work on mapping symbology, data preparation and data verification continues.

 - Additional work completed on build-out scenarios for existing designated urban lands including sanitary treatment requirements.

6. Haldimand County Lake Erie Hazard Mapping & Risk Assessment

- Multi-year project initiated.
- Accomplished January to March:
 - Issue and Closing of Request for Proposal for the project.
 - Review and scoring of consultant submissions completed.
 - Terms of Community Liaison Group developed and candidate list created.

7. Population, Household and Employment Forecasts Update

- Project initiated.
- Accomplished January to March:
 - Draft of Request for Proposal completed and under review.

Other Accomplishments (in first guarter):

- Deferral of Development Charges report and agreement for 36 unit Wabasso Gardens seniors project.
- Continued monitoring of and training relating to various Provincial initiatives and draft guideline documents, including Land Needs Methodology, Watershed Planning, Climate Change Adaptation and OMB reform.
